Course Description

This course is a continuation from World History I and will pick up with the Crusades and European Middle Ages, then look at societies and empires in Africa and the Americas, the Reformation and Renaissance, followed by European interaction with Asia, Africa, and the Americas, the Scientific Revolution and Enlightenment and finish with Imperialism. We will look at how societies and empires interacted through trade, religion, ideas, technology and war, which helped shape the modern world as we know today. We will also take a look at the impact of major wars and battles throughout this time period and examine how the outcome affected future leaders, events and decision making.

Students will also be able to

- i. Read text on a more figurative level
- ii. “give back” or explain information in your own words, without the use of direct quotes; to paraphrase and summarize
- iii. Read, ask, and answer historical questions
- iv. Draw connections between past events and current events. Especially how past events impact the formation of the present

Homework: Homework includes reading required text(s), completing a reading guide and answer questions from the section review in complete sentences. In order to assess the student’s grasp of the course material, students are expected to participate in class discussions.

Notes are considered homework and failure to have notes complete when due will result in dismissal from class on that day and most complete them outside of the classroom.

Tests: Students will be given notice ahead of time as to when tests will be given. There may be unannounced tests if I feel that the students are not doing their work

Classwork: Students will be required to complete in-class reading and writing assignments, worksheets, group activities, and debates. Students are expected to participate in class discussions and they are also required to take notes in class.

Papers: Students will have to complete at least one 2-3 page paper and one 3-4 page final paper. The topics will either be chosen by the teacher and/or the student.

Paper Structure: 12 pt. type in Times New Roman and double spaced. Any other font or spacing will not be accepted and will cause significant points to be taken off and likely resulting in a failing grade

Presentation: Students will have to make at least one presentation during the semester on topics of my choice. Presentations will be given in class and must be created in a PowerPoint style with text and pictures

Classroom Rule:

1. Be on time and prepared each and every day
2. No food, gum chewing, (if caught, gum will go on your forehead or lose **10 points** on your **FINAL GRADE**) or drinks are allowed in class
3. No using the bathroom during class, must be used before class begins and with permission of will be considered late
4. Students must be properly dressed and follow the dress code
5. Only talk when it is your turn to talk and do not talk when someone else is speaking
6. Respect the teacher, fellow students, class material, school property, and anything in the classroom that is not yours
7. What I say is final

Phone Policy:

No cell phones are to be used in my class. Students are to put their phones in the brown box on the side desk when they come into class at the start of the class. If any student is caught with a phone during class, the phone will be taken away and kept for a week or longer and student will lose points on their final grade.

Course Policies:

Students are responsible for their work and there are NO excuses. All assignments must be completed on time. Being absence excused or not, from class is not a reason for incomplete or missing work. The student is expected to have all assignments upon returning to class. It is the responsibility of the students to contact peers or the teacher for assignments in case of absence(s). It is not the responsibility of the teacher to see that any absent student completes missed work. Unacceptable behavior (excessive talking, poor self-control or anything deemed by the teacher) will result in the student's inability to participate in class that day. Any removed students are still responsible for materials covered in class that day, although credit may not be given.

Tardies:

Failure to report to class on time without a note from a teacher or administrator will result in a lowered grade at the end of the term. Every three (5) lates will lower your grade by a third or more. Ex. 5 Lates = B+ to a B, 10 Lates = B+ to a B-

Late Policy:

Any assignment that is late will have points deducted per day and no work will be allowed to be handed in after 2 days

Course Materials:

Students must have a spiral notebook or a binder with loose leaf for notes and other in-class projects and a folder for handouts. All written work, in-class or homework must be done in black or blue pen (typed work is acceptable) No pencils or markers. Your textbook, *Ancient World History* will be left at home unless otherwise instructed. Your packet on important battles must be brought every day.
